2018 Taster Days

Each year the Branch organises Beekeeping Taster days aimed at helping members of the public decide whether they would like to take up beekeeping, but also at providing a general appreciation of honey bees. This is a day-long event and takes the delegates through where honey bees can be kept, the equipment, cost and time involved, the beekeeper's year and how to become a beekeeper or help bees in other ways. Subject to the weather, we will also provide an opportunity for them to don a bee suit and handle bees, should they so wish, under the close supervision of a beekeeper in a local apiary.

There are two Taster Days in prospect this year, one on Sunday, 29th April at BBKA and another in early September

Typically, 12 - 20 delegates assemble at 09.45 a.m on the day and, after tea/coffee, the morning is spent on talks with plenty of opportunity for questions on the various aspects of bees and beekeeping outlined above. We also mount a small display including posters, skeps, hives, beekeeping tools, observation hive, hive products and perhaps honey tasting to keep the whole thing light hearted. After a "bring your own lunch" we repair to the apiary for the bee handling experience.

These taster days are one of the ways in which we fulfil our charitable aims and whilst not the primary objective, does act as a means of recruiting delegates onto our Introduction to Bee Keeping Course.

This year we are looking for member helpers to share their knowledge and enthusiasm and help make these interesting and informative events. There are several roles to be filled including setting up, meeting and greeting, dispensing refreshments, supervising honey tasting, conducting a group of wannabees for the hive opening session or giving one of the presentations. We do have a slide pack and a script if you are comfortable with presenting or just want to give it a go.

None all these roles require attendance for the whole day if you can only make part.

Hints and Tips

- Being able to pick up a queen is a very useful thing to do. Practice by picking up drones in the hive or better still, practice by picking up workers from inside a window when they become trapped in the house. When you pick them up by their wings, their abdomens curve away from you so that worker stings are out of harm's way! (Thanks to Tim Foden for this contribution)
- Colony development is really increasing this month. Supers need to be added to prevent the hive becoming
 overcrowded. This is best done when the brood box is about three-quarters full of bees. As with many aspects
 of bee keeping there are divided opinions on how to add successive supers. However if they are added just
 above the queen excluder then the young bees will be able to occupy this space more readily and thus relieve
 the pressure in the brood box.
- On fine days the bees will be collecting early spring pollen. Without it the colony cannot expand and will not be
 able to take advantage of the approaching spring blossom. Crocus, snowdrop and willow are the principle
 sources. Remove the mouse guards to assist the pollen delivery!
- Make hygiene a priority this year! Always take a bag or box with you during an inspection to put those odd bits of comb, lumps of wax and propolis in.
- If you are going to the Convention or thumbing through the new catalogues, keep your eyes open for good ideas about how to use your hive products to make a gift. There is always a Class in the Honey Show for a gift for a special occasion and with the Show on 13th September there is plenty of time to hone your skills.
