There are several suitable locations on the farm and all have good 24/7 access and security is good. The site could accommodate at least 8 stocks and would be suitable for both a single of two or three beekeepers. The small holding itself is mixed arable and pasture with woodland, hedgerows, reed beds and a carp lake. On the other side of the barn heavy metal gates were removed, concrete blocks and the crud of five years occupation by beekeepers were cleared for an even bigger JCB 509-23TC articulating telly lift. This machine in the hands of this driver I am sure, could drive it to thread a needle in the dark.

In the meantime, the unit was jacked up and placed on rollers and then pushed by the boys (and one girl) into position for the telly lift. After much threading of this needle the unit was placed on the trailer for its journey to its new home. Later after successfully positioning the unit into the new barn, the circus travelled to Dalehouse lane.

The problem this time was to move Tim's palace, in one piece, off the raised plateau. Once again, the JCB lifted it with ease and trundled across the field and reversing down the slope and out to the waiting trailer parked on the road and off to Hurst Farm. This time no anxieties as previously with the unit, with the low bridge in Crackley lane, and after Mick S showed us his new-found skill of levitation, the shed was once again pushed by the gang into place. The whole operation was over by 1300hrs. Just in time for a delivery of cakes from Maggy.

It's not often thing I have any input into work to plan, however this time was the exception. My thanks to all that took part, without whose help the whole operation would not have happened.

Spreading the Word - Charlecote Mill, Hampton Lucy

Charlecote Mill one of only a small handful of surviving commercial, working water-powered flour mills in the UK and retains all the atmosphere and charm of a mill run in Victorian times. Most of the processes used are as they would have been over 200 years ago and wherever possible grain is sourced from local farms keeping the food miles to almost zero! This truly is a place where time stands still and where quality and tradition blend perfectly to produce the unique Charlecote flours.



The miller, Karl Grevatt opens the mill to the public twice a month throughout the summer. On these open days he has offered our Branch a pitch, completely free of charge, where we're able to set up a small marquee to display information, leaflets, maybe an observation hive and if we wish, to sell local honey and hive products to his visitors whilst waiting for the tours to begin. We trialled this venue successfully a couple of times last year sharing the location with an Artisan Baker who used flour from the Mill.

The mill is currently under threat from a proposal from the Avon Navigation Trust to allow river navigation between Stratford and Warwick, so the open days are a superb way of drawing the public's attention to this. Since the honey bee is also under threat from development, there's a certain synergy here!

Hints and Tips

Thanks to Peter Spencer for this helpful hint

- When prising frames apart during inspection always put your hive tool to the inside of the join to the vertical. This will protect the join and prevent the frame from weakening.
- Here is the recipe for this year's Honey Cake Class in the Branch Honey Show which is on 13th September.

Honey Cake Recipe

200g/7oz self-raising flour, 175g(6oz) honey, 110g/4oz butter, 175g/6oz sultanas, 2 medium eggs, 110g/4oz glace cherries(halved), a little milk if needed

Preheat oven to 180°C, 350°F, gas 4. Cream butter and honey together. Beat eggs well and add them alternatively with sifted flour then fold in sultanas and cherries. A little milk may be added if necessary. Bake in a buttered circular tin, 16.5-19.0cm (6½ -7½ inches) in diameter for approximately 1½ hours. Timing is a guide as appliances may vary.

By popular demand, this year, fruit has been included.

This has sparked a discussion on how to stop the cherries sinking to the bottom and giving that 'two tone' effect! Ideas so far have included washing and drying the cherries, dusting them in flour or poking the cherries in once the mixture has been poured!
