The proceeds from the Taster Day fees are donated to a bee related charity and in this case over £500 was raised for Bees Abroad. So, all-in-all, a very gratifying outcome for all the hard work and bonhomie of the members who gave freely of their time, enthusiasm and knowledge.

Free Wax

The Branch has 76 super frames with drawn comb which is beyond re-use in the hive and is offered to members to render down for wax craft or exchange for foundation with the major bee supplies companies. By using the branch's steam extractor, which is available for home loan, this becomes a very straight forward and simple task. No payment is required. We just ask that you scrape and scorch the supers and boil up the empty frames and return them to the branch. A new facility about to be offered by the branch will even make the boiling of frames an easy task.

Displaying to Attract

Spring is the time when displays by creatures proliferate in the natural world and WLBK is no exception. Since the last edition of Bee Talk, our display season has really taken off with attendance at 8 different events including three on the same day, two weekends running. This admittedly did test our physical and organisational resources somewhat, not to mention our steward's endurance but, much to the team's credit, they managed to get through them successfully. The popularity of the "Ecofest" event in the Pump Room Gardens" came as a bit of a surprise. Being the first time that the event had been held, we had to hazard a guess at what to expect and staff it accordingly. Probably riding on the back of "Extinction Rebellion" the public turned out in force and our stand was among the most popular as hive product sales in excess of £1000 bears witness. Our unsuspecting team of stewards responded magnificently and saved the day. We shall know better for next year.

All but one of the other events lived up to, or exceeded expectations with Napton Cidery Open Day, not unsurprisingly, proving particularly popular with both the public and our stewards! On the following weekend our stand at the Craft event at Kings Hill was a practical way of expressing our gratitude for all the co-operation we have received from that organisation and netted some £230 of honey sales.

We are now approaching the two premier events of our programme with **The Kenilworth Show on June 8th and the Leamington Peace Festival over the two days of the 15th and 16th June. We are now actively appealing for volunteer stewards for both events**

The **Kenilworth Show**, held in a field just opposite the entrance to Stoneleigh Park, is the closest thing we have to a County Agricultural Show in Warwickshire and is fertile ground for offers of sites for out-apiaries, new candidates for our Taster Days and Introductory courses and hive product sales. It is open from 9.00a.m. until 5.00p.m and we divide the day into three shifts - 9.00a.m.- 12.00p.m.; 12.00p.m. – 2.30p.m.; 2.30p.m. – 5.00p.m. - which leaves plenty of time for stewards to explore the fun of the fayre. In view of the early start, we set our stand up the afternoon before (Friday 7th) and also need volunteers to help then. We start loading up at our former Dalehouse Lane Apiary at 2.00pm and, as the showground is only a mile or so away, we should be done erecting the marquees etc by about 4.00p.m.

The "Extinction Rebellion" effect is expected to be reflected in the popularity of **the Leamington Peace Festival**, being held in the newly refurbished Pump Room Gardens at the bottom of The Parade, and, with the environmental threats to our girls, is a particularly apposite opportunity for us to promote our craft.

The festival is a two-day event held in the heart of the town and is aimed at people of all ages wanting to find out ways of living life in a more harmonious way with each other and the environment. It provides a mix of family friendly activities, including workshops, talks, free music and other entertainment, vegetarian food stalls, environmentally conscious stands and some "interesting sights and smells"

This event opens at the far more comfortable time of 11.00 a.m. and we usually steward the event in two shifts. In the past our stand has been frenetically beezy and thus, as far as the mantra

"Peace and Love" is concerned, although we can expect very little "Peace" for our stewards rest assured, that the "Love" is unaffected.

Hints and Tips

• On average rape honey will granulate within 10 days of being sealed in the comb. So watch out for when the yellow flowers fade and harvest it as soon as possible.

As you extract your honey don't forget to think about the **HONEY SHOWS** and save some of the good looking jars for entering. It's really useful to get expert opinion on your produce.

This year the **Branch Honey Show** has a class for wax candles so keep the wax capping's separate, as they are the best for making candles and wax blocks.

There is also a show class for frames ready for extraction.

The judge will be looking for ease of extraction, so no crystallised honey. Freeze the frame to prevent crystallisation.... and don't forget to defrost on 11th September ready for the show on 12th!

The judge will also be looking for evenness, cleanness, flatness, comb proud of the wood for easy decapping, fullness, no travel staining or propolis, woodwork sound and clean.

So quite a lot to think about and remember the branch have frame display boxes available for you to borrow to really set your exhibit off.
