Hive Products Sales Opportunity

We have two shows coming up this month - 10TH June – Kenilworth Show and 17th – 18th June – Leamington Peace Festival - and, as usual, we are offering to sell members' honey and hive products on our stand on a sale or return basis. This is quite a useful opportunity for producers of small quantities and is all part of the encouragement and support offered by the branch. We like to have a range of products and suppliers forming our display as customers often favour suppliers local to where they live. We do endeavour to give each supplier's products equal exposure on our stand and our volunteers try not to favour one supplier over another when promoting sales.

We will be selling clear and set honey at £5, £4, and £3 for 1lb, 12oz and 8oz jars respectively with a 50p premium added for speciality honey - heather, borage, lavender and ivy etc.

Please note a 10% levy for branch funds will be deducted from sales which will be waived for those suppliers who volunteer to help on our stand at the event.

We have a good idea of the sales of individual products we can expect to make at these events and need to source supplies accordingly. To this end, if members wishing to take advantage of this opportunity would contact Gill Grimshaw (gill@gillgrimshaw.co.uk) for wax products or Di Hetherington (dihethers@yahoo.co.uk) for honey at least 7 days before the event., we will confirm back to you the supplies required and delivery arrangements.

Naturally, all products need to comply with relevant legal standards, as does the labelling. Products also need to be of merchantable quality. In the case of any doubt on these scores the stand organiser will decide.

Registration with Bee Base

As a Branch, we would encourage all members to register your apiaries with Bee Base as soon as possible, if you have not already done so. This will give you early warning of disease outbreaks in the area or, perish the thought, any enhancement of the risk from pests such as the asian hornet and small hive beetle.

To Register go to http://www.nationalbeeunit.com/index.cfm and follow the instructions. If you need grid references to identify the location of your apiary these are displayed if you hover your mouse over the location in Google Earth.

Volunteers required to staff the BBKA "Swarm Line"

The administrative staff at the British Beekeepers' Association (BBKA) Headquarters are inundated with the calls during the swarming season and are constantly being interrupted in their work. They would welcome assistance again this year from Warwickshire members in dealing with these calls ('Swarmline').

To do this we require volunteers who would be prepared to spend a half day, morning or afternoon, sitting at BBKA HQ taking telephone calls from the general public and advising accordingly. There is a folder kept at BBKA that advises on the procedure.

The calendar is set up on the Warwick and Leamington branch website from Monday, 8th May to Friday 7th July. Go to the home page of the website, click on the swarmline calendar on the right hand side and follow the instructions. Please do volunteer if you feel that you have the time. Even if you are working take a relaxing morning or afternoon off! We have 260 members and if each covered one session we would have the whole period filled.

Our experience in the past has been that it has been interesting and good fun. The BBKA staff are very grateful for our assistance and it will go some way in thanking them for the help in return that they freely give to us.

A Bargain

Apifuge is a harmless but effective bee repellent spray commonly used for the quick inspection of bees and is particularly useful at this time of the year.

After recovering a swarm many bees will attempt to return to their original settling place and spraying the foliage for example discourages them from resettling. This can be particularly helpful when collecting casts as they may lack the gathering focus of a prime swarm. A number of casts that have emerged from a single hive and are scattered over a hedgerow for example can be particularly awkward to deal with and where use of a repellent is helpful.

It is for these reasons we have been stocking Apifuge. We have a few cans past their use by date but from recent personal experience know they remain effective.

They are available from our coop purchasing stock for only £5.00 a can compared to £9.98 on the Thornes website and to which has to be added carriage costs.

My advice is get your order in quickly whilst we still have a few left.

Hints and Tips

On average rape honey will granulate within 10days of being sealed in the comb. So watch out for when the yellow flowers fade and harvest it as soon as possible. As you extract your honey don't forget to think about the Honey Shows and save some of the good looking jars for entering. It's really useful to get expert opinion on your produce. This year the Branch Honey Show has a class for wax candles so keep the wax cappings separate, as they are the best for making the candles and wax blocks.

Beware the 'June gap'! In some parts of the countryside there is a lull between the dandelion and blossom crops of spring and the big tree flowers such as horse chestnut in July, and bees may even need feeding. However this should not be of concern to you if your bees are visiting domestic gardens, as there is a wealth of forage to be had.

Monitor for signs of robbing from weaker colonies and, if necessary, re-introduce the entrance block.
