Are my ears attracting bees?

I recently discovered that my failure to do what I'm asked is not only because I've not been listening. My hearing has deteriorated. I was referred to Warwick Hospital and issued with a pair of digital hearing aids, which have transformed my life.

A few weeks ago, I was picking apples in the garden when a bee zeroed in on my left ear. Reacting with a thoughtless swipe, I flicked the aid into the long grass where no amount of raking and cutting has revealed it. A week later, £90 worse off and wearing a replacement aid, I was targeted again and stung just behind the same ear.

I read that bees can detect vibrations in the comb in the range of roughly 200Hz to 500Hz, and can detect airborne sounds in the range of 300Hz to 550Hz. My aids sometimes emit a feedback whistle, especially if I cup my ear. Is this attracting them?

The audio technician tells me that my problem is not uncommon among beekeepers. What she doesn't know is whether the bees are actually attracted to the aids. (But she does recommend removing them while gardening. More are lost in the herbaceous borders than anywhere else.) Are they? What's your experience?

Incidentally, the audio technician is now thinking of enrolling on a beekeeping beginners' course. So there's some good news!

Hints and Tips

Thoughts may be turning to Christmas. You might like to try this recipe out, it is very easy, very very yummy and would make a lovely gift.

Honey Fudge

115g butter

450g granulated sugar

1 (397g)tin condensed milk

2 tablespoons honey

140ml full cream milk

A pinch cream of tartar

Line or grease a 18cm (7inch) square tin.

Heat all the ingredients together slowly until completely dissolved.

Bring to the boil, stirring all the time, until it reaches 114 °C or 240 °F on a sugar thermometer.

Remove from heat and continue to beat until it thickens. Pour into tin.

When it has cooled slightly, mark into squares. Set it aside to cool completely

Should make about 16 pieces.

Walnuts in dates with honey and orange blossom water

This is a lovely little Christmas gift, perfect to eat with coffee, wine or just as a little snack. Its roots are Middle Eastern and it seems particularly Christmassy in a very sticky way. They last a couple of weeks, though don't keep them in the fridge.

Makes 1 250g jar

1 250g jar, cleaned and sterilised in boiling water
2 tbsp orange flower water
6 dates
6 walnuts out of the shell
Boiling water

- 1. Pour the honey into the prepared 250g jar. If your honey is too thick to pour, a few seconds submerged in boiling water or 10 seconds in the microwave makes the honey more runny and easy to use.
- 2. Remove the stones from the dates and push walnuts in their place. Add them to the honey in the jar with the orange flower water, top up with boiling water and stir around a little, then seal with the lid while the mixture is still warm.

Parsnips and Honey

Why not try something a bit different with the parsnips this year? Cut 2kg of them in half lengthways, parboil for 10 minutes and drain. Toss with 2tbsp runny honey, chopped fresh thyme, salt and pepper to taste, 10g of butter and 2 tablespoons of olive oil. Lay the parsnips flat in a roasting tin in one layer, and roast for about 40 minutes, turning occasionally until golden...... Delicious

Reported in the press recently

Almost half of Manuka honey on the high street is fake, a study suggests.

It means British shoppers are wasting around £20 million a year on the 'liquid gold', which sells for £9 to £60 a jar because of its claimed anti-bacterial and anti-inflammatory properties.

Around 2500 to 3000 tonnes of Manuka honey is produced in New Zeland each year – but 6,500 tonnes is sold by retailers.

Rowse Honey estimates that 45 per cent of Manuka honey sold in the UK might be fake. To qualify, honey must contain a sufficient amount of Methylglyoxal, known as MGO.

But tests funded by Rowse found products sold by Harrods, The Manuka Doctor and Queen Bee Manuka all contained low levels of MGO, with Harvey Nicholls' Manuka 15+ honey lacking in MGO altogether. Harvey Nichols said its 'trusted suppliers...ensure that our Manuka honey is 100 per cent authentic'. The other firms did not respond to requests for a comment.

Did you know?

Having a spoonful of unprocessed honey before bed can support your brain function. The fructose is stored as energy reserves in the liver, ready to fuel the brain overnight.

Brain activity does not stop when you sleep – it is a constant and so requires a continuous energy charge. Honey provide this so you wake feeling refreshed.
