Website Resources

At the last Branch Committee Meeting the subject of website access to the Warwickshire Beekeepers site was discussed. As a member of the Warwick and Learnington Branch all have access to the site (www.warwickshirebeekeepers.org.uk) but what you will need for access to the members area is the username and password. They are easy to remember – Username - beekeeper: Password - drone.

Don't forget that you also have access to the BBKA website (www.bbka.org.uk) and to the Animal and Plant Health Agency's (APHA) National Bee Unit's **BeeBase** (www.nationalbeeunit.com). In the case of the BBKA access to the member's area is set out in its home page using your membership number. For BeeBase beekeepers with active colonies will have already registered to record their hives.

Membership Renewal for 2018

It is that time of the year again where expenses appear on the horizon thick and fast. Included in this is individual member's renewal of their membership of Warwick and Learnington Beekeepers Branch of Warwickshire Beekeepers for 2018 accompanied by the fee. Subscriptions are due by **31 December 2017**.

As in previous years your membership, with the exception of Associate Members, will cover your renewal with Warwickshire Beekeepers' Association and with the British Beekeepers' Association.

The first step is to complete the renewal form on the home page of the Warwick and Learnington Beekeepers website <u>www.warleambees.org.uk</u>.

The second step is to pay your subscription either by BACS payments (Account No 00173056, Sort Code 30-94-93, Account Name Warwick & Learnington Spa Branch of WBKA) or by cheque (made out to W & L Beekeepers and sent to Mrs Val Dillon, Oak Tree Cottage, Cryfield Grange Road, Kenilworth, CV8 2JU). The fees are as follows:- Full Members inclusive of insurance for up to 3 colonies* - £45.00; Partner Members - £20.30; Junior Members - £16.00; Associate Members - £5.00. * Full Members should add £2.00 for the additional insurance up to 5 colonies, £5.25 for the additional insurance to 10 colonies, £7.75 for additional insurance up to 15 colonies, £9.50 for additional insurance up to 20 colonies and £11.10 for additional insurance up to 25 colonies.

A call to the Wild

I had one of those phone calls all Beekeepers dread last month "I've been given your name as we have some problems with Bees in an old Willow Tree we have to fell"

The first visit revealed a very old Weeping Willow leaning at a steep angle ,50 foot tall, across the garden and not near any buildings thank goodness.

There was clearly a very active Honey Bee colony going into the base of the tree but we were unable to estimate how long they had been there or how big the nest was going to be!

After giving the normal advice! And asking that they give me a call when the team are about to come and fell/demolish the tree so I can be at hand to try and save the colony.

Needless to say I got a call a couple of weeks later to say they had " chopped down" the tree and the Guys using the chainsaws got stung by the defending Bees.

So on the second visit I turned up expecting to find a right mess but to be fare foliage and trunks cleared away and I was faced with an open stump and a calm Colony going about their own business even if the "Roof" was missing from the homestead.

The owner of the Stump then tasked me if I could take the bees away ,as he films it, as they are coming to grind down the stump tomorrow.

The owner set up his camera, set to record and then most of the time retreated to a safe distance even though I had given him a Veil and decent gloves to wear.

After removal of the comb I left them to gather in the box and collected them that evening.





The next day transferred them into a National hive and fed them a little Pollen Substitute I had left from the Spring and a good lump of candy.

It was the wrong time of year to mess around putting combs into frames so they were sat onto a solid floor within two super boxes and covered with a Queen excluder so they had somewhere firm to attach the combs to for the winter.

A week later a Novice Beekeeper who wanted to increase the size of his Apiary came and took them away and hopefully they are strong enough to survive the winter.

Two guesses who will be helping to get them into a" proper"brood box and frames but that's a problem for 2018

Last but not least a couple of weeks later the owner of the "Old Willow" who has a lot more sophisticated filming and editing skills than I sent the following "You Tube" link enjoy the show.

Hints and Tips

140ml full cream milk

Thoughts may be turning to Christmas. You might like to try this recipe out, it is very easy , very very yummy and would make a lovely gift <u>Honey Fudge</u> 115g butter 450g granulated sugar 1 (397g)tin condensed milk 2 tablespoons honey

A pinch cream of tartar Line or grease a 18cm (7inch)square tin. Heat all the ingredients together slowly until completely dissolved. Bring to the boil ,stirring all the time, until it reaches 114C or 240F on a sugar thermometer. Remove from heat and continue to beat until it thickens. Pour into tin. When it has cooled slightly, mark into squares. Set it aside to cool completely Should make about 16 pieces . Can add nuts, cherries, dried fruit, coconut, peppermint flavour etc to the mix or partly dip the set pieces in melted chocolate to make an interesting assortment. Enjoy!
